-Martin Luther King Day Jan. 21st
King was born on January 15, 1929. He rose to the fore of the
civil rights movement in 1955 with the Montgomery bus
boycott that followed the arrest of Rosa Parks. An advocate
of Mahatma Gandhi's philosophy of using nonviolent
resistance to effect social change, King promoted the use
of nonviolent means to bring an end to racial segregation in
the United States. In 1964 he was awarded the Nobel Prize
for Peace for his efforts. He was assassinated in 1968.



-Holocaust Remembrance Day Jan. 27th
This day commemorates the victims of the Holocaust,
which resulted in the genocide of one third of the Jewish
people, along with countless members of other minorities
by Nazi Germany between 1933 and 1945, an attempt to
implement its "final solution" to the Jewish question. 27
January was chosen to commemorate the date when the
Auschwitz concentration camp was liberated by the Red
Army in 1945.
